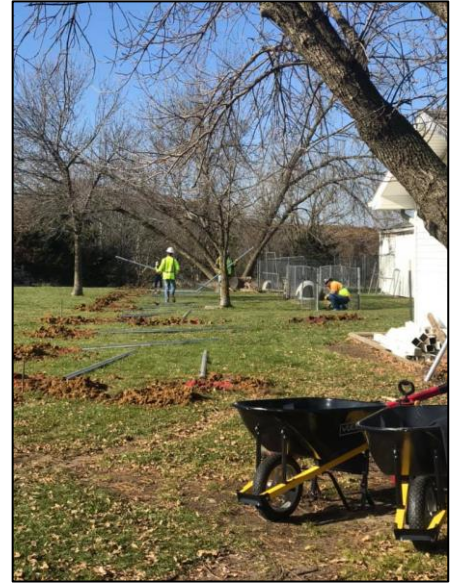

What's going on at the shelter?

Project Prosper Our dream of having a place for dogs and puppies to run and play has come true. An Ameren service project called "Project Prosper," named after one of Mark Twain's favorite dogs, Prosper, made it happen. With Ameren's Mark Twain Transmission Line Project nearing completing, crews and project officials wanted to give back to the community. The project consists of a fenced-in, 5,000 square foot dog play yard, which gives dogs and puppies time and space to get outdoors. For persons interested in adopting, the fenced area provides a place to play with the dog before deciding to take the dog home.

Project Prosper was made possible by Ameren and the Mark Twain Transmission Project contract partners L. Keeley Construction, Volkert Inc., and Contract Land Staff. The project includes fencing and posts donated by Ameren Transmission and concrete donated by O'Laughlin Inc. The project also included a large donation of dog food and much needed cleaning supplies for the shelter. We can't thank everyone involved enough. The donations have made a huge difference in the daily lives of our shelter dogs and puppies.

Shelter Improvements With thanks to our volunteers Rob and Cheryl Christianson, facilities at the shelter are improving. The back area for the large dogs has long needed maintenance. Last winter large sliding panels were added to the covered, but open-sided, structure. On nice days the panels can slide out of the way for good air circulation. On cold, windy, and snowy days the panels can be shut. Once the panels were shut we realized the lighting in the area was inadequate. Thanks to the Christiansons, the lighting has been totally updated with new lights down the center of the area and a light bulb above every kennel. What an improvement! But that is not the end of it. With cold weather here and the never ending challenge of keeping the water bowls from freezing, Rob came to our aid again. Rob and Cheryl installed heated water bowls to each kennel. Chipping ice is no longer needed. Thank you Rob and Cheryl!

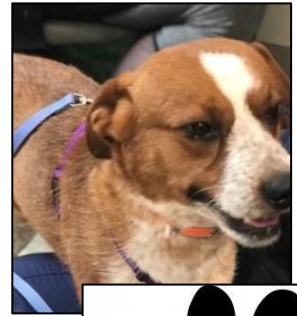

Surgical Suite Work on the highly anticipated surgical suite housed in the old cat room continues. We have had a few delays which have pushed our target completion date to March 2020. At that time we will be able to host the University of Missouri Shelter Medicine participants to perform spays and neuters on site. That will be a big time and cost savings for everyone. Our animals will be much healthier! Stay tuned for more details.

Popcorn & P4P The December 2019 graduation class of the Puppies for Parole (P4P) program at the Moberly Correction Center included our very own Popcorn, pictured to the right. Popcorn came to us as a pretty feral fellow. But with lots of love and care from our staff, especially Natalie, Popcorn became a great dog. A highlight of graduation was learning the mother of the offender who trained Popcorn adopted him. The offender will be released at the end of January 2020 and Popcorn will be waiting for him.



In another great story from the December 2019 class is that Merle, also one of our dogs, was adopted by the Moberly Correction Center to serve in their Veterans Ward.

Graduation is an inspiration as we listen to the offenders talk about the dogs they care for, the impact the program is having on their lives, and what it means for their future. It is life changing for them and for the dogs they care for. The Adair County Humane Shelter has participated in this program for three years.
